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GENERAL INFORMATION

The D.A.S. is a non profit organization with membership open to any individual who is interested in astronomy upon payment of the annual dues. Guests are always welcome without charge or obligation. Our purpose is to encourage and promote the study of astronomy and related sciences.

The D.A.S. meets each Friday evening at the Crowell Recreation Center located at 16630 Lasher Road, Detroit, Michigan. The center is 1/4 mile south of McNichols (Six Mile Road), on the east side of Lasher Road at the traffic signal light. This facility is a modern well-equipped building with ample off street lighted parking. It is operated by the City of Detroit Recreation Department and it is their finest facility serving this side of the city. Since we are their guests it is important to be considerate in the use of the Crowell Recreation Center to insure our continued welcome.

The meetings consist of talks, lectures, films, slides, mirror making, sharing and fellowship with Astronomy as our common denominator. There will generally be someone present to assist those who are grinding and polishing a mirror starting at 7:00 p.m. most members arrive at 7:30 p.m. and when there is a feature presented it will begin promptly at 8:30 p.m. The regular business meeting for the general membership is held on the second Friday of the month and at starts promptly at 8:30 p.m. The officers and Board of Directors meet privately on the first Friday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the mirror polishing room. In all cases we ask that the last person be out of the building by 10:30 p.m. to accommodate the building custodian.

Annual dues are as follows and most categories include SKY AND TELESCOPE magazine mailed to your home. Regular \$20.00, Junior \$10.00, Family \$25.00, Regular Associate \$13.00, Junior Associate \$3.00. Also included in the membership is "The Reflector", a newsletter of the Astronomical League.

MIRROR MAKING - "Scratches & Bubbles" by John Kuzia, Master T.M.

In the making of Pyrex, it is almost impossible to cast a mirror blank with modern production methods without some air holes or other bubbles trapped in the glass. When these bubbles are near the surface they sometimes break through the surface of the mirror.

When this happens some people keep on grinding till no holes appear; however bubbles or holes on the surface can be painted black after aluminizing without affecting performance.

Defects left on the surface depend on the size of blank. For 4%", the maximum size bubble is 1/8", up to three of these provided they are one inch apart. For 6" or 8" mirror's, three bubbles up to 3/16" in diameter if they are separated by one inch or more. For 10" or 12%" mirrors, a maximum of four bubbles up to 1/4" is acceptable, if they are separated by 1%" or more.

Scratches on the mirror do very little actual harm since they cut off only a small fraction of the light, but they do make the workmanship look poor, and you will be more proud of your mirror if it is free from them.

OBSERVING - Claude McEldery

This Spring there are 4 planets in the sky for our evening viewing pleasure. These include 4 of the 5 bright naked eye planets known since ancient times. They are Venus (diameter 7521 miles), Mars (4222 miles), Jupiter (88,729 miles), and Saturn (74,564 miles). If you have a telescope don't miss this excellent opportunity to get it out and do some fascinating observing.

I consider solar system astronomy one of the most rewarding fields for amateur activity. It's only been since the time of Galileo (1564-1642) and the invention of the first crude telescopes that man has been able to view the true nature of these celestial bodies. So don't be left out, be one of the select few (comparatively speaking) who have studied these amazing objects.

Hotel rooms are still available and can be obtained for you. Lodging averages \$8.00 per night per person, based upon 4 persons per room. Based upon 5 people per vehicle and two nights lodging, total expenses (lodging and gas) will be about \$40.00. This deposit cannot be refunded if you must change your plans, and the spot cannot be filled.
